In that shifting moment between sleep and being awake, my mind was working hard to determine first, that I wanted to do a POTA activation, and two, what park I wanted to visit. I mustered the mental energy to decide to do so by creating a plan, and then to execute the plan. If you are reading this, it means I worked the plan.

For ninety percent of the time, I was the only person at the horse park area of the park. I sat on a small flat, maybe two acres in size, surrounded by hilltops all around. My solitude was blanketed by a grey, gloomy, and overcast sky. The sky looked like so many dirty pillows packed tightly together, stretching to the horizon.

After my setup was completed, I was on the air by 11:20 local time. I first started on the 15m band with no luck. I then dropped to the 20m band and stayed there for the remainder of the time. However, for over 30 minutes no one answered my CQs. My mood became as grey as the sky. I decided if I did not get a contact within one hour, I was going to pack it up. Fifteen minutes before my self-imposed deadline, I got a call!

haved, I generally got 57s or 59s for a signal report. Still, it took a little over an hour to get fifteen contacts.
